
Zoom B1 bass effects pedal £54.95

The lightweight Zoom B1 unit is

priced. Built within a tough plastic shell, it offers a fantastic choice of bass effects and doubles as an in-line tuner. A jack socket is also provided for adding a swell pedal should you need one. The Zoom B1 runs perfectly well on internal batteries but it can also be wired to the mains by means of an AC Adaptor. This is not included in the price but suitable units are easily available at your local music shop and will cost between five and 10 pounds.

SOUNDS: It comes loaded with all the popular sounds: distortion, chorus, delay, auto-wah and octaver, plus a whole plethora of new ones. All are very easily accessed and, although you can switch through many variations of each effect, you are also given the opportunity to modify and store your own sounds then easily recall them. This ability to tweak each effect to

Danelectro 12-string £399

An extremely cute electric 12-string from one of the coolest manufacturers ever... by Simon Bradley



THANKS TO A CERTAIN

Liverpudlian quartet, a particular type of 12-string electric will always evoke memories of the British Invasion and, if the bank just won't stretch to a Ricky 330-12 or Gretsch Country Classic 12, this new jangle monster must be one to

try pretty darn sharpish.

Danelectro guitars will
always make you smile – we
rekindled our love affair with
a trio of Longhorns back in issue
276 – and although we are fans of the
singlecut '56 Pro, the shorthorned vibe
of this new 12-string is palpable.

Demonstrating the classic Dano construction of masonite (hardboard) top and back plates affixed to a laminated wooden framework, the shorter 25-inch scale and compact body does make this a snug guitar. The 21-fret rosewood 'board is unavoidably wide – 45mm at the metal nut – yet the bolt-on maple neck is extremely comfortable, making for a good playing experience.

SOUNDS: A pair of Alnico-driven lipstick single-coils are controlled by volume and tone pots plus a three-way toggle, and provide just the right amount of jangle for your jingle. Remember that the central selection puts the two pickups in series, thus

Verdict

This is a very cool and reasonably-priced 12-string with a substantial dollop of history behind it to boot. If a Ricky is too out of reach, you could do a great deal worse than this. Every guitarist should allow themselves the chance to own an electric 12-string as you'll be inspired; the musical possibilities are endless...

MXR EVH117 Flanger £215

It's Eddie Van Halen unchained with the second of his signature MXR stompboxes by Simon Bradley

FLANGERS CAN OFTEN BE THE

most unsubtle of effects and, if you're not careful, they can smother your carefully crafted tone with all manner of iets, swirls and wooshes. Trust Edward Van Halen to use such a device to give a further injection of pace into a number of the band's classic riffs.

Most notably it's the intro riff to the track Unchained (from 1981's Fair Warning) that benefits and, in a stroke of impressive forethought, MXR have included that setting as a preset. The pedal operates in the usual manner but. if you have the small EVH button

depressed when you turn the pedal on, you have just the right setting to play that iconic riff.

MXR's EVH Phase 90 is resplendent in the trademark red, white and black stripes, and the livery here is from an even earlier period: the original black and white paint job from Ed's Frankenstein Boogie Bodies guitar. What's more, certain parts of the front panel glow in the dark.

Power comes from a pair of standard nine-volt batteries and, as you'd expect, the pedal is built like a tank.

SOUNDS: As a generic flanger the modulation is warm and organic with plenty of headroom within all four controls. As with all flangers, it's best used sparingly for maximum effect.

Regardless of the undeniable quality across the board here, that \$215 price

Line 6 Variax Acoustic 300 Nylon £524

A new Variax but the usual brilliant mix of technology, performance and tone... by Simon Bradley

technology really does work and all that's required is a leap of faith, a step we can nevertheless understand that many may be unwilling to consider.

We'd suggest that this new nylonstrung Variax offers the last best chance for you to finally become a convert as using a traditional gut-string either live or in the studio can prove a real bind. Here, the slimline mahogany and solid spruce body offers a choice of either a trebly flamenco or warmer standard classical body model, plus all points in between thanks to a handy mix control.

You can add reverb, compression and alter the virtual mic placement via a trio

of sliders and then store all settings into one of 10 user locations: there's even an on-board tuner.

The 19-fret neck is a joy, our example was set up with a perfect string tension and height and the only downside we could think of is that the solid body disallows any sort of percussive accompaniments to your flamenco masterpieces.

SOUNDS: Where to start? In a nutshell, you can obtain the gamut of classical. Spanish and flamenco sounds you have in your head in just minutes. We used an AER Acousticube III for our sound tests, but be aware that without a full range cab, the sound won't be so excessively sparkling. merely excellent. This would be something else through a full PA though...

If you dabble in home recording, you should get one of these guitars without further ado – and that goes for professional outfits too. Live or to hard disc, it's unlikely the Variax Nylon will ever let you down, which is praise enough: just fantastic.
